#### **Letter from the Mayor**

Hello, Neighbors.

In 2023, the State Legislature passed the Housing Opportunities Made for Everyone (HOME) Act 47; legislation intended to address the statewide housing crisis. The HOME Act compels Vermont cities and towns to update local zoning laws to support increased housing development, reduced parking requirements, and increased density. The City Council directed the Planning Commission to maximize the HOME Act changes in service of affordable, 3BR+/

family-sized units, and homeownership opportunity – our housing priorities.

The Commission has spent the past 5 months working through our Unified Land Use and Development Regulations (ULUDR) to meet the intent of the law and Council direction but is also mindful of community impact. For example, much

of Winooski's residential district was built before any zoning regulations were in place at a higher density rate. In many cases, the HOME Act density requirements will better match what has already been built. The Home Act also guided the commission to consider adjusting existing incentives for priority housing, green building standards, and multi-modal transit options, where the HOME Act's density requirements are greater than what we've previously established.

The Planning Commission held a public hearing last month to take public comment on the proposed changes, which will ultimately be forwarded to the City Council for consideration. Our Planning and Housing Commissions have also begun considering additional changes to support priority housing development. This could include a mandate for new development to replace any housing units lost, such as 3 bedroom+ units, or inclusionary zoning, which requires a certain % of Affordable units, as we continue working to ensure new housing built in Winooski meets the needs of residents and our community's vision to ensure a mix of quality housing that maintains and enhances Winooski's unique sense of place and supports the needs of the entire community.

#### **School Board Update**

Summer is nearly here! As I write this update in early May, temperatures are still a little chilly at times, but there's no denying that full Summer is just around the corner. Plants are growing green and lush, animals have emerged, and people everywhere seem just a little happier.

And, of course, construction season is in full swing! This year, Winooski's long-awaited Main Street Revitalization project has started. This project will completely transform Main Street for the better in the coming years, but in the meantime, it will also cause a lot of disruption and street closures, including at the entrance and exit to the Schools. I know it's been said before, but I want to take a moment to once again thank the community for supporting our schools on Town Meeting Day. There's no denying it's been a difficult year for education in Vermont, but Winooski showed overwhelming support for our students and their futures, even in the face of so much uncertainty and misinformation from all sides. Thank you again for your support!

So, what has the Board been up to since then? As always, our primary focus has been to review, update, and add to our policies as needed. One policy I am particularly proud of that just passed this month is our updated policy on Search and Seizure of Students by School Personnel (Policy C21). As you might imagine, this is a complicated and important issue, and we reviewed several versions over multiple meetings and requested feedback from as many stakeholders as possible, including students themselves. We feel the final policy gives personnel the tools they need to ensure a safe school environment while also

ensuring student and parent rights are valued and protected.

But the thing about policy is it's never truly done! We'll return to this policy in time, as we do with all our policies, to ensure they continue to meet the needs of an ever-changing education environment. And when we do, it's always important for us to hear from you! Our job isn't to set policy in a vacuum but, hopefully, as much as possible, to set policy that meets the will of our constituents, the residents of Winooski, and the needs of all the stakeholders involved.

With a budget in hand, we've also been looking ahead to the new year. Among other things, we've approved a school year calendar and a slight delay in the start of the student day (from 8:00 to 8:15) at the recommendation of the Superintendent. We also recently ratified a contract with our Support Staff Union. We're very proud that we were able to come to a timely agreement with staff that makes important investments while also being well within the budget you supported in March. Thank you to everyone on both negotiation teams and the Administrative staff whose work and due diligence made the process so smooth and successful!

Another thing we've been working on is increasing our engagement with various community groups in the City, building on work done during the budget process. But you don't have to wait for us to come to you! As a reminder, our regular meetings are on the second Wednesday of every month, at 6pm at the School Library, and we are always happy to have public participation. Virtual participation options are available, as well. You can always contact us anytime using the contact information at the back of the newsletter.

## Winooski School Antiracism Steering Committee Update

The Winooski Antiracism Steering Committee (ARSC) is tasked with implementing the six demands of the Winooski Students for Antiracism (WSA): to form a truth and reconciliation commission, hire and retain more faculty of color, establish a multilingual mentoring program, implement an ethnic studies curriculum, conduct an equity audit of the school, and host a yearly workshop for students where they can learn about their civil rights.

On Monday, May 6th, the ARSC held a powerful Dialogue Event for members of the Winooski School community at the O'Brien Center. The goal of the event was to kick off the work of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, one of the six WSA demands. Close to 50 people attended the event, participating in fun community building activities and facilitated conversations. They also enjoyed a delicious dinner provided by Waterworks Food + Drink.

During the evening, youth from the ARSC shared the progress that the team has made toward implementing the WSA demands, and showed a short video about the work of a Truth and Reconciliation Commission in Canada. Melody Mackin, a member of the Vermont Truth and Reconciliation Commission (VTRC) also spoke of the commission's work on the state level. After the presentation and dinner, participants split up into three groups, in which ARSC youth facilitated dialogues about experiences of race and racism in school.

Some of the questions the youth posed included, "What is an aspect of your race or ethnicity that makes you feel good or proud?" and "In what ways does your race or ethnicity impact your experiences with school? Has it ever contributed to a problem or uncomfortable situation?" The conversations were powerful and informative, with community members sharing their personal experiences and actively listening to the other participants.

The facilitators created space for open and respectful dialogue, and, at the close of the evening, many attendees expressed gratitude for the opportunity to engage in such vulnerable conversations. They commented on the skill of the youth facilitators, and that they were leaving feeling educated, hopeful, inspired, and proud.

The team's next steps are to review the themes that emerged from these conversations, and brainstorm ways to share them out with the larger Winooski community. Later that same week, St. Michael's College Professor Jolivette Anderson-Douoning facilitated a workshop for Winooski Middle School students, leading them through discussions and activities on knowing their civil rights. Dr. Anderson-Douoning will be facilitating similar workshops for students in the high school as well as parents/caregivers next year.

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#### **Health Office News**

It has been a joy to serve the needs of your students this year. To date, the health office has logged over 5,000 student visits district wide, triaged hundreds of phone calls and sent many students to the dentist via SSTA transportation. Our School Based Health Center (SBHC) served several hundreds of students this year through 3 days a week of onsite operations or televideo appointments. Our amazing dental hygienist, Tracy, worked on site several days a week providing cleanings, screenings, sealants and fluoride treatments to students.

#### **Immunizations:**

If your child is going to be in kindergarten then they will need an updated copy of immunization records. Please make sure they have had 5 doses of DTP/Dtap, 4 doses of IPV, 3 doses of Hepatitis B, 2 doses of MMR and 2 doses of Varicella. If they don't then please call your child's primary doctor to schedule an appointment for them.

<u>If your child is entering the 7th grade</u>, please make sure they have had their 2nd dose of Varicella and a tdap booster.

Do you exempt your child from immunizations? If yes, please make sure to stop by the health office before 11am on June 13th to fill out an exemption form for next school year. Otherwise, they are available on the Vermont Department of Health's website. Remember without updated immunizations, a renewed exemption form or a doctor's note stating their next appointment they can't start school in the fall!

#### **Medical Conditions:**

Does your child have asthma and/or allergies? If so, then please get the asthma/allergy action plan completed over the summer and have an inhaler, spacer and/or epi pen ready to bring in on the first day of school. It can also be faxed to 802-383-6017.

#### **Medications:**

<u>IFK students:</u> We kindly request that parent(s) or a designated adult pick up their children's prescription medication(s) by 11am on Thursday June 13th.

MSHS students: MSHS students are allowed to pick up their own epi pens and/or inhalers. All prescription tablet medications must be picked up by a parent or their adult designee by 11am on Thursday June 13th.

<u>All Students:</u> Any prescribed medications left after this selected date and time will be disposed of at the Winooski Police Department.

We have enjoyed serving the health needs of your kids this year and wish everyone a safe, happy and healthy summer.

The Winooski School District is participating in the Summer Food Service Program.

As always, students participating in summer programming offered through the Winooski School District or the City of Winooski will have access to breakfast, lunch, or both depending on the hours of the program.

Students who are not registered in programming are also eligible for meals. **Starting on Monday, June 24th**, students may come to the Myers Memorial Pool for lunch. Meals at the pool will be available at 12:30pm Monday-Friday. This meal service will run through August 16th.


**Every child in Winooski, aged 0-18, is eligible for summer meals.** Summer meals will be provided to all children without charge and are the same for all children regardless of race, color, national origin, sex, age or disability, and there will be no discrimination in the course of the meal service.



**Dog Licenses**: Per state statute, all dogs owned in the City of Winooski must be Registered with the City Clerk on or before April 1. Now that it is May, the costs are as follows:

- New dog licenses (for those who have just moved to Winooski): \$14 (altered) | \$18 (unaltered)
- New licenses for existing dogs after April 1: \$16 (altered) | \$20 (unaltered)

**Elections:** To register for the upcoming Primary and General elections, please register at *olvr.vermont.gov*. To request an absentee ballot, please visit *mvp.vermont.gov* or contact us at the Clerk's Office or visit *winooskivt.gov/vote* to learn more.

**Reappraisal 2024:** The Change of Appraisal notices will be mailed to all property owners in the next few weeks. There will be opportunities to file an informal or formal grievance in June. Please visit our website at *winooskivt.gov/reappraisal* for further information.

Residents may also find these resources helpful via the Vermont Department of Taxes:

Renter Credit (money returned to you after you file your taxes) is available to eligible Vermonters if: You rented in Vermont for at least six months You were not claimed as a dependent You meet the income eligibility limits based on your family size For details, please visit *tax.vermont.gov/individuals/renter-credit*.

Property owners who live on their property should have declared their homestead with the Vermont Department of taxes by April 15th. If you did not file by this date, a penalty will be applied. Homestead declarations must be made even if you do not believe you owe property taxes in order to qualify for Property Tax Adjustment. Filing a Homestead Declaration is easy and can be done online at the Vermont Department of Taxes website at tax.vermont.gov/property-owners/homestead-declaration. Be sure to file your homestead and or property tax adjustment claim even if you do not have to file Federal Income Taxes.



#### **Main Street Revitalization Project**

Throughout construction, the Project Team is sharing weekly project updates to keep the public informed about construction activities and impacts to traffic and parking. Visit the project website at winooskivt.gov/mainstreet to view these updates or sign up to receive them by email. Multilingual project updates are also available on the website in 14 languages.

This construction season began with crews installing new sewer lines along the west side of Main Street. In June, crews will continue to install new sewer and water systems along Main Street. Activities will take place Monday through Friday between 7am and 7pm. There may be night and weekend work when needed.

During construction, Main Street is reduced to a single lane, allowing northbound traffic only. Southbound traffic will be sent to Weaver Street. The detour is in place 24 hours a day, seven days a week. There are times when traffic from side streets will not be allowed to turn onto Main Street due to work within the intersections. Travelers should be alert, use caution, slow down, and pay attention to signs and flaggers.

On-street parking is not allowed on Main Street within the active work zones during work hours. Look out for temporary No Parking signs. On-street parking is also reduced along the entire length of Weaver Street to keep clearance for emergency vehicles. There is no parking allowed on the east side of Weaver Street south of the Stevens Street intersection and on the west side of the street north of Stevens Street.

Construction activities will require short temporary impacts to driveways and utilities. If you live in or own property along Main Street and would like to be contacted about direct impacts by phone, please fill out the form on the project website at <code>winooskivt.gov/mainstreet</code>. The contractor will also notify impacted property owners with flyers and by knocking on doors.


