Letter from the Mayor

Hello, neighbors.

My update this month addresses our community vision. May is typically the time of year that the City Council and City staff begin our annual strategic planning process. This work is guided by our Strategic Vision, Master Plan, and ongoing progress - which you can view at winooskivt.gov/vision. In the last few

at winooskivt.gov/vision. In the last few years, we focused on assessing priority initiatives and projects while being thoughtful about our resources. This year, we're

taking a different approach. Following another fiscally challenging budget and ongoing community concerns about affordability, we'll focus on creating a sustainable plan for staffing and our capital plan (city assets, facilities, equipment, etc.). We'll review our current commitments and their financial impacts and decide when it may be reasonable to take on new debt. We'll also review our core services to outline what the City must provide and what kinds of services are "nice to have". We may choose to scale services



back to ensure we can meet our core service needs. For context, since the initiation of the downtown revitalization project in the early 2000s and the adoption of Form-Based Code in 2015, our city has aimed to grow our Grand List (increasing the tax base to relieve extra pressure on property taxes). This strategy generally equates to only about ~1% growth a year, which unfortunately does not keep up with inflation.

Over the past 10 years, Winooski has grown by ~1,000 residents and ~500+ housing units. Over those same 10 years, city staffing has only increased from 49 full-time staff to 53, resulting in a serious capacity issue. And, the City has taken on nearly \$50M of new debt through bond votes in the past 6 years alone. We've also added new programs and policies that increase demands on our staff, like Short Term Rental regulations, All Resident Voting, new policy advisory commissions, new processes to increase community engagement, equity and inclusion initiatives, and more. We have reached a tipping point where we need to determine what is feasible with our current resources before taking on new projects and initiatives.

The City Council and staff will continue to work towards keeping Winooski affordable, vibrant, and community-focused. We encourage you all to come to the City Council meetings and stay engaged while we make these important decisions!

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Main Street Revitalization Project: Construction Underway

Construction started on the Main Street Revitalization Project in late April. This construction season will focus on upgrading water, sewer, and stormwater systems. Work began at the south end of the project area near the intersection of Main Street and Maple Street and continues north. Activities will take place Monday through Friday between 7am and 7pm. There may be night and weekend work when needed.

Construction will require

single-lane closures along Main Street. Throughout most of construction, Main Street will be reduced to northbound traffic only. Southbound traffic will be sent to Weaver Street. The detour will stay in place 24 hours a day, seven days a week. There may also be cases of alternating one-way traffic and brief road closures with detours.



Travelers should be alert, use caution, slow down, and pay attention to signage and flaggers. To keep access open for emergency vehicles, on-street parking will not be allowed along Main Street within the active work zone during work hours. On-street parking is also reduced along the entire length of Weaver Street.

Throughout construction, the Project Team will share weekly updates and traffic alerts as needed to keep the public informed about construction

From the Superintendent

Have you ever wondered how we decide to call for a school day closure or delay during inclement weather? Here is a summary of the steps:

- Consult with the National Weather Service in Vermont and monitor the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA)'s briefings throughout the day. All Vermont superintendents receive updates via email.
- 2. As soon as the possibility of a strong weather event is apparent, so strong that it could lead to closures, the area superintendents begin an email chain and consult with each other individually via phone and text. In some cases, a group call is necessary.
- 3. Consult with road crews, city officials, and WSD facilities members about facilities readiness for the event.
- 4. Make a decision the day before if enough information is available. If the outlook is still unclear, begin a cycle of consultation the next day as early as 4 AM.
- 5. Locally decide whether to close or delay primarily based on Winooski's roads and ease of access from neighboring towns

School Board Update

And the most important policy we have is our District's Ends Statement: All students will graduate from the Winooski School District (WSD) college and career ready at a cost supported by majority of the Winooski community. Now that the budget process is complete and it has passed, I look forward to working with my board colleagues and the administration to gather information about how we are achieving this Ends Statement over the coming year. I am looking forward to learning more about the centralized data system our Director of Curriculum is working on, which should help the Board use data when determining how well we are meeting our goals.

This work is what excites me most about being on the school board because our students' future matters. I highly encourage



and the district's facilities readiness, including parking lots. Importantly, ensure that buses can safely run their routes uninterrupted and on time.

- 6. If no delay or closure is deemed necessary, consult with area superintendents about their situations in their respective districts. If most surrounding districts have closures, it is best to follow suit due to the interconnection between communities to avoid staff shortages for the day and the confusion from town to town.
- 7. If a delay is necessary whether due to obvious dangers to a regular opening or due to most or all surrounding schools deciding to close, an announcement to families, community, and staff is made via phone and email before 6 AM.
- 8. Postings are made to our social media and website.
- 9. A report is made available to the media via the WCAX portal, which sends it to all other media.

all members of the community, whether you have children in the school or not, to participate and attend board meetings.

All members of our community are invited to attend school board meetings in person or online. We meet the second Wednesday of the month at 6pm, and the agenda is posted several days in advance of the meeting on the WSD website. I look forward to continuing to collaborate with my fellow board members, the administration, and members of the community to ensure the investments we make in our students' futures produce excellent results.

Winooski School Antiracism Steering Committee Update

On March 18th and April 1st, youth and adults from the Winooski school community gathered for the 11th and 12th meetings of the 2023-2024 Antiracism Steering Committee (ARSC).

During the March meeting, the committee met virtually with two members of the Vermont Truth and Reconciliation Commission (VTRC). Mia Schultz and Melody Mackin discussed the work of the commission and answered questions from the team. They also had some questions for the ARSC! It was an inspiring and informative conversation, and the team looks forward to partnering with Mia and Melody, and applying what they learn to the school's own truth and reconciliation commission. During the meeting on April 1st, representatives from the City Office shared information about the Winooski Equity Action Committee, which will be continuing the work of addressing inequities in the larger community. They invited all members of the ARSC to join the committee, and discussed the celebratory event they are hosting in June. Alison Novak, education reporter for Seven Days, also attended the meeting, interviewing members of the team about their school. She is co-writing an article for an upcoming issue about housing in the city, and wants to include the youth perspective. Jolivette Anderson-Douoning, Scholar-in-Residence at St. Michael's College and DEI consultant for the district, spoke with the team about designing civil rights workshops, one of the six WSA demands.

The Truth and Reconciliation team met to debrief the conversation with members from the VTRC, as well as continue designing their community event in May. They extend the following invitation to current and former Winooski School students and their families!

This is Winooski's fourth Community Iftar. Iftar is the meal Muslims break their fast with at sunset during the month of Ramadan. In 2021, Winooski held its first Community Iftar via zoom. 2024 marks the third in-person community event where members of all faiths are invited to learn about Ramadan and celebrate our community's diversity.

Students, families, and community members gathered in our well-decorated new cafeteria. More than twelve students spoke about what Ramadan means to them and the significance of this community event. "Gratitude is the word of the night. If you remember anything, I want you to remember gratitude," said Sauro Ali, a twelfth grader. Nearly all guests agreed, and expressed gratitude for this event.

"It is so great to have this space, to honor our students and families, and to give people a chance to learn about our religion," said Abdi Osman.

Imam Malacalim Abdirazaq Farah of Winooski also spoke at the event, before Abdi and Sherihan welcomed all Muslim guests to break their fast and invited them to prayer in two designated



classrooms. After prayer, all guests enjoyed the iftar, the meal to break the fast.

"The food was so good! Like, truly, amazing!" said eleventh grader Winner Mampuya. The food was both donated and brought by our students' families, as well as purchased from local area restaurants thanks to generous donations from the Winooski Parent-Teacher Organization and some school funding.

Dog Licenses: Per state statute, all dogs owned in the City of Winooski must be Registered with the City Clerk on or before April 1. Now that it is May, the costs are as follows:

New dog licenses (for those who have just moved to Winooski): \$14 (altered) | \$18 (unaltered)

New licenses for existing dogs after April 1: \$16 (altered) | \$20 (unaltered)

Elections: To register for the upcoming Primary and General elections, please register at olvr.vermont.gov. To request an absentee ballot, please visit mvp.vermont.gov or contact us at the Clerk's Office or visit winooskivt.gov/vote to learn more.

Property Tax & Utility Payments: Property tax and utility payments are due on May 15, 2024! Stop by the Clerk's Office to make your payment or visit winooskivt.gov/pay. Payments are due on or before May 15, we do not accept postmarks.



Reappraisal 2024

The assessed values effective for 2024 will be mailed to all property owners in early June. Please be aware that even if your home is exactly the same as it was in 2007 (the year of the last city-wide reappraisal), your appraised value will be greater, due to market conditions now compared to 2007, and inflation. However, in that case, your municipal tax bill would not increase at the same rate as your appraised value. That is because the municipal tax rate adjusts to what is needed the City budget, not based on assessed property values.

Residents may also find these resources helpful via the Vermont Department of Taxes:

Renter Credit (money returned to you after you file your taxes) is available to eligible Vermonters if:

- You rented in Vermont for at least six months
- You were not claimed as a dependent
- You meet the income eligibility limits based on your family size
- For details, please visit *tax.vermont.gov/individuals/ renter-credit*.

Property owner's homes that meet the State's definition of a "homestead" are required by law to file a **Homestead Declaration** every year by the April deadline. If eligible, it is important that you file so your homestead tax rate is correctly assessed. For full details, visit *tax.vermont.gov/ property-owners/homestead-declaration.*
