MEET WILMER CHAVARRIA WINOOSKI SCHOOL DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

On the evening of Tuesday, May 2, 2023, the Winooski School Board announced the selection of Wilmer Chavarria as the Superintendent of Schools for the Winooski School District (WSD). He assumed responsibilities on July 1, 2023.

Previously, Chavarria served as the Director of Equity and Education Support Systems for the Milton Town School District, where he led efforts to enhance student support structures and establish comprehensive equity frameworks across schools. His leadership journey also includes tenures as a school principal in New Mexico, where he spearheaded innovative programs such as Dual Language Immersion and districtwide art initiatives while significantly improving academic performance and student support systems.

Chavarria's dedication to academic excellence began as a National Board-certified teacher with expertise in English Language Arts, Spanish Language Arts, Bilingual Education, and English as a Second Language. His outstanding contributions earned him recognition as an "Exemplary Teacher" by the New Mexico Public Education Department.

His formative years were marked by a global pursuit of learning. Chavarria's educational odyssey began in Ocotal, Nicaragua, where he attended school in a settlement for refugees following the Nicaraguan Sandinista-Contra conflict. Continuing his studies in Nicaraguan public schools, he graduated from high school before receiving a scholarship to the United World College of the Pacific in British Columbia.

Following his time in Canada, Chavarria ventured to the U.S. to pursue his undergraduate studies at Earlham College in Richmond, Indiana. He holds graduate degrees in Education Leadership from the University of New Mexico and Education Policy and Management from Harvard University.



HIGH SCHOOL

ACCREDITATION

Winooski High School is accredited by the New England Associations of Schools and Colleges (NEASC) and the Vermont Agency of Education.

CURRICULUM OVERVIEW

For over 10 years, Winooski has been developing and refining a proficiency based learning model. Through community-wide collaboration, WHS developed a set of graduate expectations in 6 mastery skill areas: Communication, Critical Thinking, Culture and Community, Persistence, Creativity and Wellbeing. Students demonstrate their proficiency through traditional WHS classes, through capstone projects and via multiple diverse learning opportunities.

SCHEDULE

For the 2024-25 school year, Winooski High School has moved to an A/B day schedule. Students take up to four classes per day, with Green and White days alternating. Prior to the 24-25 school year, WHS ran a 4x4 schedule. This had four blocks a day and students completed a traditional full year course in one semester. This allowed for students to focus on fewer courses at a time.



GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

To meet Graduation Requirements, students demonstrate proficiency in both the skills and dispositions needed to be college and career ready. The required Graduation Proficiencies are:

- Civic Reasoning
- Critical Reading
- Critical Writing
- Financial Literacy
- Historical Inquiry
- Mathematical Reasoning
- Non-Native Language*
- Physical Health
- Scientific Reasoning
- Social-Emotional Health
- Speaking & Listening
- Performing or Visual Arts

*Students whose native language differs from English have the opportunity to demonstrate proficiency in their native language. Those students who are successful will then use English to demonstrate their non-native language proficiency.

The Graduation Proficiencies are assessed in the classroom through Performance Indicators derived from the national standards of each content area. Graduation Proficiencies may also be met through participation in a variety of Flexible Pathways in which these skills are taught and applied.

The Graduation Expectations are assessed through a Capstone format. Students may complete a Capstone in various years throughout their high school career. A Communication Capstone is required of all students. Two additional Capstones must be completed based on student choice and interest in the remaining five areas of Creativity, Critical Thinking, Culture & Community, Persistence, and Wellbeing.



ADDITIONAL LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

In part due to the relatively small size of our student body and the diverse array of learning backgrounds and styles, WHS seeks to offer a broad range of learning opportunities beyond those of a traditional comprehensive high school both inside and outside of the building. These include opportunities to enhance English language, math and literacy skills within the curriculum, as well as co-enrollment at two local technical centers (Center for Technology Essex and the Burlington Technical Center).

iLab

iLab offers students the opportunity to explore interests outside of the mainstream curriculum with scheduled support from a staff member.

Work-Based Learning

Work-based learning includes job shadows, service learning, apprenticeships, and internships. This can also be used to demonstrate proficiency through iLab, or integrated into a Capstone project.

Onion River Schoolhouse

This integrated yearlong half-day program incorporates real world projects partnering with community members and experts. Students work on multiple projects over the course of the year allowing them to demonstrate proficiency in multiple disciplines.

VTVLC & VHS

Online courses offered through the Vermont Virtual Learning Cooperative and Virtual High School expand Winooki HS course options including AP and honors courses.

Dual Enrollment/Early College

The state of Vermont funds two college courses for all VT high school students between the end of their sophomore year and prior to graduation. In addition, the state funds a year of college classes at many of the state's colleges to complete a senior's high school experience.



ADDITIONAL LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

At Winooski School District, we are deeply proud of how diverse our community is, including linguistically. We believe that multilingualism is a significant advantage and positions our students to engage meaningfully with our increasingly global society. In order to be more responsive to the needs of our students and ensure that students' skills and knowledge are fairly represented, WHS students have the opportunity to engage in an assessment process to receive a Distinction of Multilingualism, proving that they are verbally fluent in more than one language.

MIDDLE SCHOOL

Our Community: Winooski Middle School is a caring, committed, and inclusive community that ignites curiosity and fosters joy in learning. We are proud to nurture students who are not only academically capable but also compassionate and engaged citizens.

Continuity in Learning: At Winooski Middle School, we emphasize the continuity of English Language Arts (ELA) instruction from elementary school, ensuring a smooth transition and consistent development of literacy skills. Our 6th Grade Academy brings students together for core, academic instruction, creating a foundation of shared learning experiences.

6th Grade Academy: The 6th Grade Academy provides a cohesive educational experience, where sixth graders are taught together to best support the transition from elementary school. This structure helps students build strong academic and social-emotional skills, preparing them for future academic challenges.

Mixed Grade Levels: Students in the 7th and 8th grades are mixed for most classes, fostering a diverse and collaborative learning environment. However, math classes remain grade-specific to address varying levels of mathematical understanding.



MIDDLE SCHOOL

Interdisciplinary Expeditions: 2-3 times a year, students in grades 6-8 engage in Expeditions—deep, interdisciplinary learning opportunities where they take on authentic roles. These experiences encourage students to tackle engaging questions and problems, collaborating with teachers, peers, and professionals. Expeditions culminate in a final event showcasing their learning. Examples include the 6th-grade Circus Expedition, which incorporates a 3-week residency with Circus Smirkus and focuses on teamwork and social-emotional learning, and the International Dumpling Expedition, integrating math, cooking, science, and more

Advisories and Student Council: Our multi-age advisories cultivate a strong student culture, providing a supportive environment for personal and academic growth. Activities include engineering challenges and Spartan Games. Small groups of students meet daily with an advisor for their three years of middle school. Student Council initiatives, such as Culture Day, celebrate diversity and community spirit.

Building Foundations for Success: We recognize the social nature of early adolescence and are dedicated to fostering a school climate of belonging to support students in acquiring the skills necessary for high school success. Through advisory, expeditions and collaborative learning experiences, we lay the groundwork for our students' future achievements.

Curriculum

WSD uses math and literacy programs that are aligned to the Common Core Standards. In both math and ELA we use programs developed by nationally respected organizations and have received the highest ratings for alignment to standards, engaging materials and usability.


English Language Arts is the core knowledge program we use to teach reading and writing to all of our students. We are entering year three with Expeditionary Learning ELA and are seeing measurable growth in our students' reading, writing, and speaking skills. This year, we have upgraded our structured early literacy (K-2) curriculum to "EL Skills Block."

Illustrative Mathematics 360 is our math program. In addition, our teachers use Math Best Practices with Habits of Mind and Interactions as vehicles to teach math to students.

In science, social studies, physical education, art, music, and health we use teacherdeveloped materials that are aligned to national standards.

WINOOSKI EARLY CHILDHOOD PROGRAM

Winooski Early Childhood Program believes investing in early childhood education can positively shape a child's future success.

Preschool classrooms are taught by licensed early education teachers who create a developmentally appropriate curriculum to ensure the meaningful participation of all learners in our diverse community. Our philosophy is to create a rich learning environment and activities that allow children the opportunity to experience social, emotional, physical, and intellectual growth. Our classrooms value diversity and honor the importance of family and culture as integral parts of each child. We strive to create a strong sense of community for our children, where they can learn, grow, and thrive together. We welcome their individuality that creates a rich classroom environment. Our goal is to provide safe and exceptional care and education for each child. We recognize that every child has different needs and responds to different interactions and we strive to work with families to provide the best experience possible for all children in the program.

In the fall of 2024, Winooski School District Pre-Kindergarten services were expanded, including opening two new classrooms and making Pre-K available to all eligible 4-yearolds in Winooski. There are now four classrooms and they are at full capacity.



PROGRAMS AND DEPARTMENTS


HEALTH OFFICE

School-Based Health Center (SBHC):

The Winooski School District serves over 700 Pre-K to high school students with diverse linguistic backgrounds encompassing 20 languages. A majority, 98%, qualify for Free and Reduced Lunch. Families encounter barriers to accessing healthcare despite having primary care providers. Inspired by neighboring SBHC models, the idea of a part-time SBHC was born. The SBHC aims to enhance students' access to quality physical and mental healthcare services, mitigating healthcare.

802 Smiles Program:

The 802 Smiles Program ensures every student can access dental care. It includes Preventive Dental Hygiene services including Dental Cleanings, Sealants, Fluoride Varnish and Silver Diamine Fluoride (SDF) application, by a Registered Dental Hygienist. All children who are Winooski School District students or siblings of students are welcome.





PROGRAMS AND DEPARTMENTS

SUPPORT SERVICES

The Winooski School District is committed to meeting the needs of all children. Under the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, or IDEA, we are required to identify and evaluate students who have disabilities and to offer them individualized education programs (IEP) for special education and related services.

An IEP team using a process specified in the law makes decisions regarding the services that are included in an IEP. The IEP team includes a student's classroom teacher, special educator, parent(s) and a representative of the school district who is empowered to commit resources such as staff time or funding. By law, we are required to carry out provisions outlined in a student's IEP.

WINOOSKI WELLNESS

Our district believes that students are only ready to learn after health and wellness needs are met. It is critical that we integrate well-being into learning so our students are empowered to identify their physical, social, and emotional challenges and take steps to grow and improve their wellness.

Veggie VanGo: Winooski School District is partnering with Vermont Foodbank to offer the Veggie VanGo program. Through the program, the Vermont Foodbank distributes produce twice a month on school grounds, thereby providing a more accessible source of fresh food to students and their families throughout the year. Veggies are available to students, staff, families, and community members.

Necessities Store: The store, at no cost to shoppers, contains: Fresh produce, culturally appropriate non- perishable goods, and winter clothing/gear for students. These low-barrier Necessities are available to any WSD student in the district and their families (no proof of income eligibility will be required). Community members can also access the store during VVG distribution days and, upon request, during school hours.



CAPITAL PROJECT

The Winooski School District (WSD) held a ribbon-cutting ceremony on April 4, 2023 in the WSD main lobby to celebrate the completion of the district's capital project.

Construction on the project began in June 2020, and ended in December 2022 creating approximately 70,000 square ft of new space including a new gymnasium, middle school, and elementary school wing, as well as renovating nearly 125,000 square ft of space.

The new building reflects a commitment to the modern advancement of the educational sector with state-of-the-art instruction and collaboration spaces, an environmentally conscious design, and impeccable safety standards and represents a bright future for education in the community, signaling a commitment to excellence and innovation that will benefit generations of students to come.


